

Cyril Francis Richards The Royal Newfoundland Regiment Regimental No. 991 World War I

Parents: Isaac and Eliza Richards


The story of WW I veteran Cyril Richards is akin to what one might read in a novel. Young soldier goes to war, is gravely injured, near death but miraculously survives, is discharged as unfit to fight. He returns home, tries to help his widowed mother, marries, has a family, lives a good life and dies of old age.

Cyril enlisted in the1st Newfoundland Regiment (the Regiment had not been given the "Royal" designation as of yet) in June 1915. His enlistment papers describe Cyril as being 5' 9" tall, with brown hair and eyes, he has a scar on his right foot from a scalding accident as a child. He is single, a labourer by trade and Church of England by religion.

According to Cyril's official service record, he would spend one (1) year and three hundred twenty-three (323) in service.

Here are excerpts from his record by date:

1. 20-03-15: Embarked St. John's aboard the S.S. Stephano



SS Stephano was a passenger liner and sealing ship, owned by Bowring Brothers and operated in their Red Cross Line of Arctic steamships. Stephano is most notable for her role in the 1914 Newfoundland Sealing Disaster, under the command of Captain Abram Kean. Stephano was the sister ship to the SS Florizel

- 2. 20 08 15 Embarked for the British Expeditionary Force (BEF)
- 3. 31 08 15: Disembarked Alexandria and then entrained for Cairo
- 4. 13 09 15: Embarked for Gallipoli
- 5. 19-20 09 15: Landed Suvla Bay the night of the $19-20^{th}$
- 6. 31-12-15: Admitted 26 CCS with Jaundice
- 7. 30 12 15: To 27th general hospital at Mudros. (Mudros comprised a small Greek port on the Mediterranean island of Lemnos.)

- 8. 31 01 16: With Battalion and embarked Port Suez
- 9. 22 02 16: Disembarked Marseilles
- 10. 01 07 16: Wounded severe
- 11. 03 07 16: Admitted to hospital at St. Pol with GSW (gunshot) wound to the head
- 12.03 08 16: Transferred to England
- 13. 04 08 16: Admitted to London General (Wandsworth)
- 14.22 09 16: Furloughed then attached to Depot
- 15. 27 09 16: To Newfoundland
- 16. ?? 10 16: Arrived Newfoundland
- 17. 16 12 16: Discharged "medically unfit"
- 18. 24 10 17: Re-enlisted and was accepted
- 19.02 01 18: Discharged.

Pte. Richards amazingly was wounded on the very day that etched in the history of the Newfoundland Regiment and the battle that virtually wiped out the Regiment at Beaumont-Hamel.

According to the official Nominal Roll of those Officers and men of the Royal Newfoundland Regiment who are shown in the records of the District Office of the Department of Veterans Affairs, St. John's, Newfoundland, who were wounded during, just prior to, or subsequent to the action at Beaumont Hamel, 1 July 1916.

Pte Cyril Richard No. 991 is on that list. He was in fact a wounded survivor of Beaumont-Hamel.

A full copy of the injury suffered by Pte Richards is inserted below (first 3 pages). It describes how he was wounded on that faithful day of July 1st, 1916, at Beaumont-Hamel.

His head wound was so severe that in hospital, he was placed on the "dangerously ill list" and not expected to recover. But recover he did although permanently damaged, experiencing memory loss and severe headaches for the rest of his life.

A testament to this man's sense of duty was that he tried to re-enlist a year following his being discharged as being medically unfit. He was accepted! This lasted just a few months however when he was discharged again.

Once home, now living with his widowed mother, Cyril wrote a letter to the then Prime Minister of Newfoundland, Sir Richard Squires asking for assistance in securing a loan to start a business in South River. He even suggested that as collateral he would use his home and land as security for the loan. (See the full letter below, (pages 4 and 5 inserts)

Cyril appears in the 1935 Newfoundland general census as married man with a family. Cyril 41 is married to Mildred (Batten) Richards (37). They have two (2) children, a boy named Cyril and a girl named Daphne. They are living in South River.

The 1945 census see the family now living in Grand Falls Proper. The family still consists of Cyril, Mildred, Cyril (jr) and Daphne.

Cyril, a long time Legion member, passed away in February 1983 and Mildred died in 1996. They are buried in the All Saints Anglican Cemetery, South River, Newfoundland.

Dir. - Having been Seriously wounded in the head on July 1 th 1916 which have left me unfit for hard labour. I am the only Support of a widowed mother my father having been dead for fifteen years I get a Rension of thirty dollars and my mother \$4.80 Res month. bull one to start astructures here in South River. to it to much dir to ask for the loan of three thousand dollars for twenty years to Pay back in four Payments at a 5% interest I will give as security my house and six acres of land valued at the same

amount as refered to above.

Trusting that you will kindly consider my request of thanking you for a reply I remain yours very respectfully by Richards
