

George Mercer World War I Royal Newfoundland Regiment Service No. 2586

George was born to parents Job and ??? on October 1<sup>st</sup>, 1897, of Country Road, Bay Roberts.

On the 25<sup>th</sup> of April 1916, George enlisted in the Royal Newfoundland Regiment as a private and was assigned Service No. 2586.

From his enlistment documents, we learn that he was a Church of England lad, enlist ted for the duration of the war, listed his occupation as paper maker, was 5 feet 7 inches tall and was able to write, since he signed the paper himself.

George's service record shows the following:

1. He embarked St. John's aboard the S.S. Sicilian bound for the U.K. on 19 July 1916.

- He embarked for B.E.F. (British Expeditionary Force) on the Western Front on 11 October 1916
- 3. Wounded at the battle of Combles, France on 3 Feb 1917.
- 4. the Capture of Combles (25 September 1916) was a tactical incident that took place during the Battle of Morval, part of the Battle of the Somme, during the First World War. Combles lies 30 mi (48 km) north-east of Amiens and 10 mi (16 km) east of Albert.
- 5. Invalided to General Hospital at Wandsworth suffering from multiple wounds to head, face, arm, and feet from an exploding bomb.
- Following convalescence, rejoined his battalion on the 24 of August 1917.
- Sent to Newfoundland on 30 January 1919 for demobilization and arrived back in Newfoundland on 7 February 1919.

George returned to civilian life following the war and by 1921 was now married to a young lady named Idelle.

George passed away a relatively young man on June 9<sup>th</sup>, 1927, at the age of 31. He is buried in the Old Valley Road Cemetery at Grand Falls-Windsor, Newfoundland
